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PART I: GENERAL INFORMATION

• DESCRIPTION OF TOWN

- SHORT HISTORY AND LOCATION

Thessaloniki is the capital of Macedonia, the northern part of Greece and the second largest city of Greece. It is situated on the picturesque bay of Thermaikos and has a history of 2300 years. It is a classical city, a Hellenistic, a Byzantine, a Balkan, a Mediterranean city, a city of the East, but also of Europe. It was first established in 315 BC by King Kassander and named after his wife, Thessaloniki, half-sister of Alexander the Great. It was from here that St. Paul, the Apostle of nations, spread the word of Christianity (50 AD). The Roman Emperor Galerius made the city his headquarters (300 AD). From Thessaloniki, the brothers Cyril and Methodius also began their mission to civilise and preach Christianity to the people of the Balkans. Thessaloniki became the second important city of the Byzantine Empire next to Constantinople. The Ottoman occupation lasted almost five centuries (1430 – 1912). The Greeks fought many wars to liberate themselves from the conquerors. In 1912 Thessaloniki was free to continue its course in history.

• SHORT DESCRIPTION OF THE ORGANISING INSTITUTION

Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (<u>www.auth.gr</u>) is a State Institution established in 1925. The structure of the University today, its range of activities and its size make it the largest and most complex institution of higher education in our country. More than 81.000 students (approx. 72.500 undergraduate & 8.500 postgraduate students) study in the University's 42 Schools, many of which, indeed, are unique in Greece.

The University Campus lies in central location of Thessaloniki a (www.auth.gr/authMaps/google_map/?lang=el). Some University Schools and faculty laboratories and facilities are situated off Campus (such as the Department of Physical Education and Sport Science, the School of Music Studies etc) as well as some independent educational or research units connected to the University (e.g. the University forests, the University Farm, the Centre of Byzantine Research etc). There are also some Schools of the University out of town.

The University Library (<u>www.lib.auth.gr</u>) is the second largest library in Greece and one of the largest in the Balkans with approximately 900.000 books and 16.000 periodicals (printed and electronic) in the central and school libraries.

In the University Campus is the University Student Club (<u>www.auth.gr/students/services/board/index_en.html</u>), which is a self-administrated part of the University, charged with the board and lodging, the medical, pharmaceutical and hospital care of the students.

The University participates in many European educational and research projects and has international exchanges and agreements with a substantial number of Universities throughout Europe, Australia, United States of America, Canada and Asia.

• ACCOMMODATION

The majority of the students will be accommodated at the University Dormitories, according to the availability of the dormitories for the particular period. In case of no availability, the School will make all necessary efforts to provide accommodation for all participants.

The University Dormitories are in walking distance (5-10 min.) from the university campus.

They provide the students with:

- one-bed and two-bed rooms
- shared or individual kitchen facilities with all the necessary equipment
- shared or individual bathrooms and WC
- blankets and bed linen
- wireless internet connection
- washing machines

The prices vary between $7,5 - 13 \in /$ person / night depending on the type of accommodation and facilities offered.

Please note that the accommodation is provided by the Department of European and Educational Programmes. In case of any modification, students will be informed, the soonest possible.
